Conclusion: Jealousy predicted measures of appearance enhancement effort, supporting our hypothesis that jealousy-related risk-taking specific to appearance enhancement can enhance one's ability to attract and retain desirable mates.






Figure 1. Females  $\dagger = p < .10$ ,  $\ast = p < .05$ ,  $\ast = p < .01$ ,  $\ast = p < .001$  (two-tailed).
